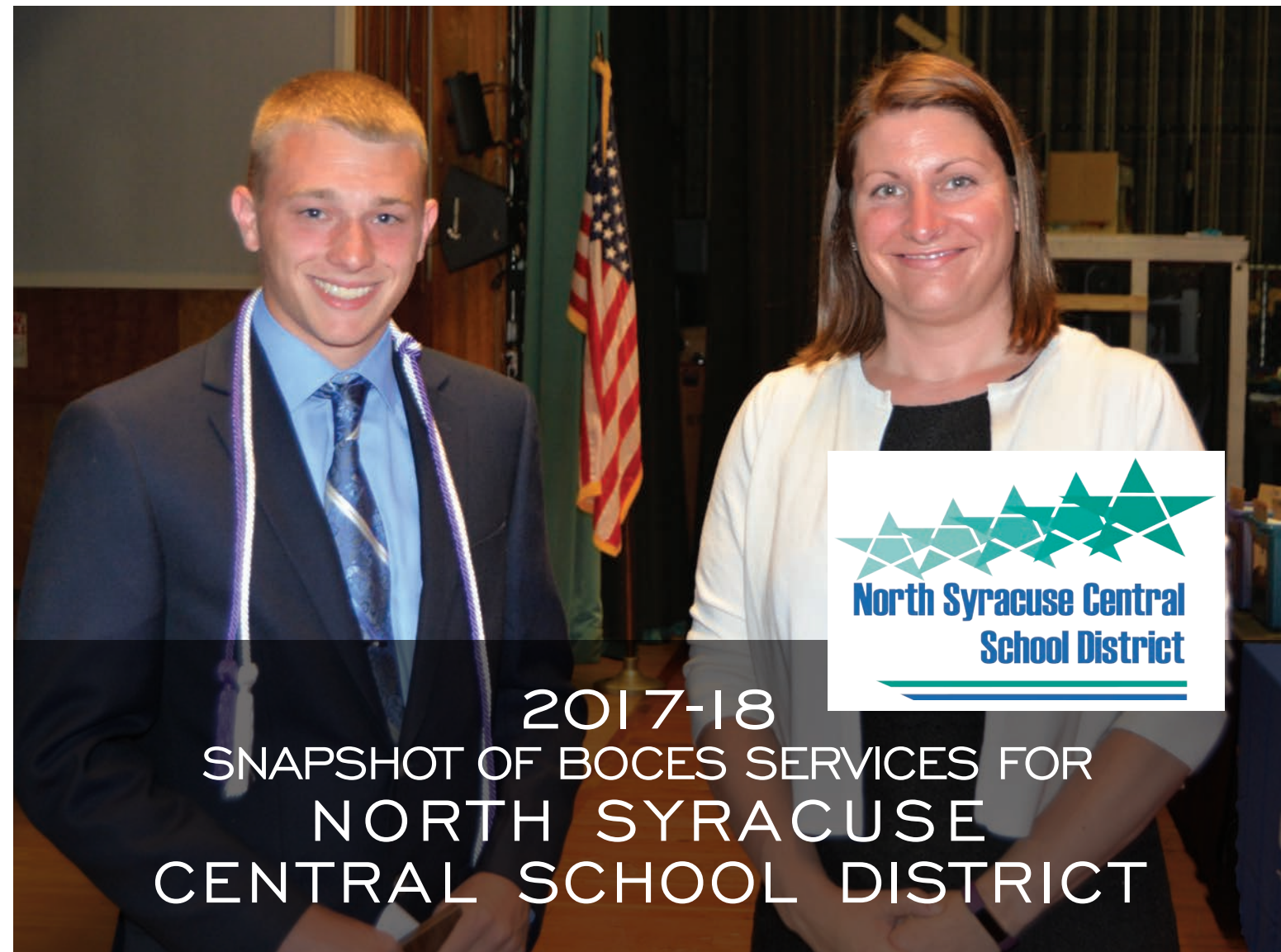

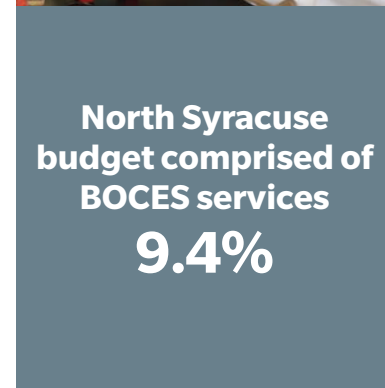

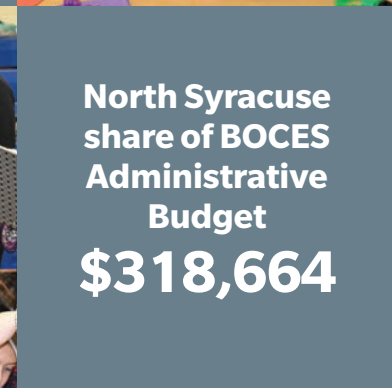

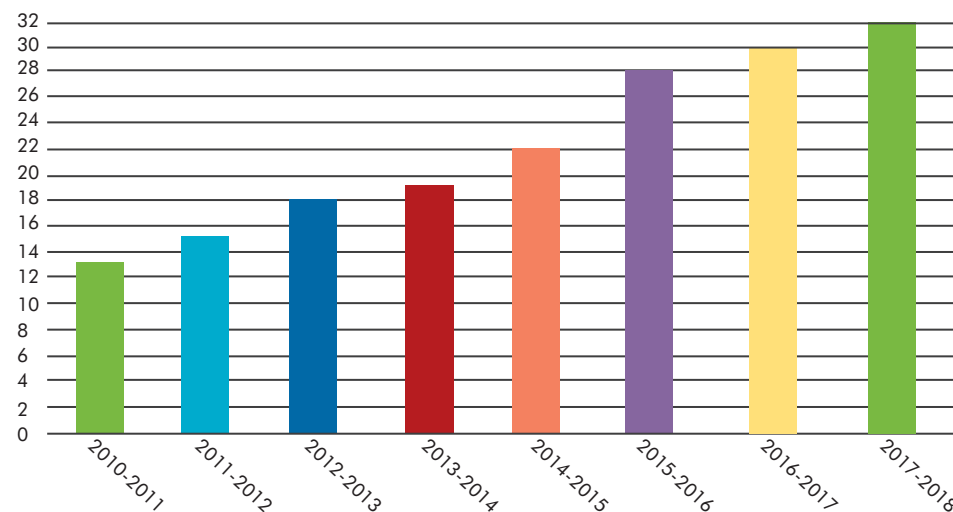
CAREER & TECHNICAL EDUCATION

New York State's approval process for Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs has raised the quality and rigor of courses that prepare students for employment and postsecondary study. Approved programs lead to an industry-recognized credential or certificate at the postsecondary level, or an associate or baccalaureate degree. CTE courses offer students the opportunity to apply academic concepts to real-world situations and prepare them for industry-based assessments or certifications. They have the opportunity to earn college credit or advanced standing while still in high school and take part in work-based learning opportunities where they demonstrate mastery of skills essential in the workplace. In addition, our Technically Endorsed programs, embedded in area businesses, have been recognized by *District Administration* magazine as one of 33 national innovative programs.

Three years ago, Dale Paine stepped into the doors of Innovation Tech after struggling with anxiety, frequent absences from school and declining grades. Today, the junior from North Syracuse is thriving. His confidence has soared. His grades are stellar. He is a leader, team player and in-house teaching assistant to his peers at the OCM BOCES New Tech high school in Liverpool, staff members said. "Now he's a rock star," said Facilitator Dave Sampson, who teaches physics and algebra.

School Counselor Kayla Beyer said Dale's previous struggles would come as a surprise to anyone who observed him at Innovation Tech. "He is an intelligent, well-spoken, and compassionate young adult," Beyer said. "Not only does Dale perform phenomenally in all of his classes, he has stepped up to become a mentor for our underclassmen."

This year, Dale was the first student to receive the school's Master Key award for exemplifying the four initiatives that Innovation Tech promotes: seeking challenges, growth from setbacks, building relationships, and impact on self and community. He also plays an active role in the school's Friends of Rachel Club, which promotes a culture of kindness and compassion in the school.

Dale said he is grateful for the opportunity to attend Innovation Tech. It has transformed his attitude about school. It has made him comfortable and confident in his learning. "I really like the teachers here because there is so much

interaction," he said.

His tutoring role at Innovation Tech has also inspired him to pursue a teaching degree after high school. He plans to go to college and possibly become an English professor.

"His accomplishments are noteworthy thus far," Beyer said, "and I am excited to see his continued growth over the course of this school year and next."

DID YOU KNOW?

A team of teachers from Roxboro Road Middle School was selected to deliver a live research lesson at the It's Go Time: Science For All conference. It was the second year in a row this team was selected. The team engaged in lesson study to plan and enact a 5th grade lesson that asked students to construct a pump system to move groundwater to the surface. This lesson was from the new elementary science curriculum materials program that NSCSJ joined this year. The team attended a three-day professional development on lesson study in August and met weekly in September and October to prepare for the live research lesson in front of approximately 60 observers from across New York State. The team represented the district and region as leaders in elementary science education. The conference was held at Roxboro Road Middle School.
