"Go Time" Science Conference: Anticipation is building for our ground-breaking, sold-out regional science conference called, "It's Go Time: Seeing the Future through the NEW New York State Science Standards." The event on Nov. 8 at Roxboro Road Middle School offers



amazing keynote speakers and a series of "live" research lessons lessons in which teachers and students will be participating in a lesson while other educators observe and begin to visualize the science standards in action. Lead testing results: In the spring of 2016, OCM BOCES tested the drinking water for lead at each of our instructional and non-instructional sites. Although we were not mandated by New York State at that time to test our water, OCM BOCES tested all water fountains and faucets normally used for drinking or cooking to ensure the safety of students and staff. Over 100 drinking water sources were initially tested, and only one drinking fountain was found to be above the EPA limit for lead. The fountain was immediately taken out of service and replaced.

Gov. Andrew Cuomo signed a new law on September 6, 2016 that requires public school districts/BOCES to test for lead levels in all water outlets currently or potentially used for drinking or cooking. In September and October 2016, 136 new samples were taken from additional sinks and bathroom faucets used by students as directed by the NY State Health Department.

Test results received to-date are posted on the OCMBOCES website under Health & Safety. Additional results are expected over the next several weeks and will be posted as they are received.

"Almost all the jobs I applied for required a high school diploma or GED," she said. "I began doing some research online for free literacy programs, and I came across OCM BOCES."

Thanks to the caring and support of her BOCES literacy instructors, Breland now has her high school diploma and a new job. She is also continuing her education at Onondaga Community College. She hopes to become a social worker. In August, she shared her story with more than 500 OCM BOCES employees as part of an "opening day" conference for the new school year.

Because of her amazing perseverance, Breland was honored Oct. 25 in Albany as the "Outstanding Student Award Recipient for 2016" by the New York Association for Continuing/Community Education.
