"Rachel's Challenge" is going gangbusters at schools throughout OCM BOCES, with students and staff enjoying "high-five Fridays," complimentary popcorn, walls of inspirational quotes and more to ignite and sustain a culture of kindness in our schools. In September, students and staff in every building heard emotional presentations from the organizers of Rachel's Challenge, a program that evolved from the deadly Columbine High School shooting in Littleton, Colorado, on April 20, 1999. In that shooting, Rachel Joy Scott was the first victim. Her writings evolved into a national program that



espouses a culture of caring in schools and communities. At OCM BOCES, students are now forming "Friends of Rachel" (FOR) Clubs and planning other activities to promote a "chain reaction of kindness," which is one of the challenges. Why Go Green? Last year's competition produced great results:

- Five of the nine buildings that participated were able to increase their recycling volume by 10 percent or more. Those buildings were Cortland Alternative School, Seven Valleys New Tech Academy, McEvoy, the Henry Student Services building and the Main Campus.
- Three buildings reduced their monthly trash volume, freeing up more space in landfills. Those buildings were the Henry Student Services building, the Henry Career & Technical Education building, and McEvoy.
