


Forty-six school psychologists, counselors, social workers and other education professionals from across the region collaborated recently to create a new, 14-page document to help educators and parents face the social and emotional challenges associated with COVID-19.

The document, called <u>Responding to Our New Normal: A Resource Guide for Educators and Parents Facing Social Distancing and Remote Learning</u>, is easy to use and packed with self-care guidance and other tools for managing the unique challenges of the pandemic:

- Maintaining the home-school connection
- Social skills in a remote setting
- · Resources to assist parents
