#### From the District Superintendent

#### Dear Staff:

During the past month, I have had the opportunity to meet with many of you during the seven <u>Conversations with the</u> <u>District Superintendent</u> sessions that were held. Because this year's conversation is so important and many of you were not able to attend, my letter to you this month will highlight the messages shared.

What will 2012 bring? This year's conversation focused on the areas of leadership change, the new evaluation system for teachers, and the fiscal pressures facing schools and BOCES.

Leadership changes. The announcement of my retirement triggers a process at the New York State Education Department that analyzes whether this BOCES should stay as it is, merge with another, or create some other configuration of school districts. The analysis process, called the Supervisory District Survey, is in the process of being completed and we are awaiting a final decision. It is not until the Commissioner indicates that the OCM Supervisory District will stay as it is that the OCM BOCES Board of Education can initiate the search. We anticipate that we will be able to begin the search within the next month.

**Evaluation system changes.** The Annual Professional Performance Review (APPR) process for teachers and principals is mandated by state law. A committee of teachers and administrators has been meeting since October to work on the development of a system that will meet the requirements. I am pleased to say that the committee is making significant process and hopes to have a draft APPR to share with the Board of Education in March. The process will be initiated in September 2012.

**Fiscal Pressures**. School districts are funded by a combination of property taxes and state aid. Both sources of revenue are being limited this year. Property taxes cannot be raised more than 2% because of new legislation that has been passed and at the same time, state aid to school districts has been limited. The fiscal pressures impact BOCES because our funding comes from school districts purchasing services. When districts have less money, they tend to purchase fewer services from BOCES.



Nicole DeRusso (with Lori Pallone) is a 2011 OCM BOCES External Diploma Program (EDP) graduate from the Marathon School District. Just prior to finishing her required work for the program in September, she gave birth to her first son, Dominic. Nicole was so dedicated to completing the program that she only took one week off from her school work, then returned to complete all of her assignments. Her hard work and dedication certainly paid off for her.

Nicole's instructors refer to her as "a model EDP student, completing all of her assignments on time and making all of her weekly appointments."

While all of our programs have been impacted to some extent, programs such as Career and Technical Education and Alternative Education have been particularly hard hit by decreased requests. While we are in the process of developing the budgets for programs now, we are awaiting final requests from districts due in April to make decisions about programs and staffing.

#### McEvoy SkillsUSA Students Support Local Food Pantry with Food Drive


