McEvoy Auto Collision Goes Green

It's what's in the water that really counts!

Phil Ramey's Automotive Collision Technology classes at the OCM BOCES McEvoy Campus have been a great example of education and industry working together this year. In February, PPG Corporation, a local company, donated their new *Aquabase Waterborne* refinishing system to the McEvoy Educational Campus Automotive Collision Technology Program.

Ramey's classes have been working with PPG for twenty years. He is thankful for the connection saying, "Due to [the company's] support, the program has always been able to stay updated with the latest refinishing technology."

In a waterborne refinishing system, the solvent is always the same: water. The color is made with latex particles and an outer sheet that dissolves outwardly into tendrils. It is the tendrils that bind the paint together. The high-tech nature of these particles is a major reason for the system's durability and ease of use.

Ramey and his students have received a great deal of training on the new technology by representatives from PPG. Many thanks to the corporation for

their time and generosity!
