On March 28, 2014, the senior Culinary Arts class at the OCM BOCES McEvoy Center, participated in their own version of the Food Network's "Iron Chef" competition. Under the direction of instructor Mrs. Adams and teaching assistant Ms. Brown, the student teams were challenged to prepare a three course meal that included an appetizer, an entrée, and a dessert. In addition, each team was required to research the cost of the ingredients and determine the mark up, then create a restaurant quality menu. To add to the challenge, students used a liquid fuel two burner stove during preparation.

Retired Culinary Arts teacher Mrs. Kay Stevens; Mr. Robert Oaksford, a chef and the purchasing director at Cortland Produce; and BOCES' own culinarian, Mr. Steve Duffy, all served as event judges. Students were evaluated on knife

skills, sanitation, teamwork, professionalism, presentation

of their final product, and the ever important taste test. The array of culinary delights included jerked shrimp on escarole, homemade pasta, and homemade cannoli.

The Iron Chef competition was held in the McEvoy courtyard, and was open to the public. Staff, students, and several parents stopped by to view the students in action. All enjoyed the fun and camaraderie and are looking forward to next year's competition.

CTE Approval/Recertification ensures high quality programs

One of OCM BOCES' goals for student services is to develop and enhance programs for students that equip them with the skills they need for post-secondary education, military service, training or to enter the workforce. OCM BOCES has a well-known and deserved reputation for offering Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs of the highest quality.

One of the many ways that OCM BOCES ensures that it continues to offer high quality CTE programs is by following the rigorous CTE Program Approval process set forth by the New York State Education Department. Approval is sought for all new programs being implemented and a recertification process is completed every five years for existing programs.



Over the course of the 2013-14 school year, the recertification process was completed for OCM BOCES' Health Occupations Technology, Graphic Communications Technology, Computer Technology and Construction Technology programs. Additionally, OCM BOCES has submitted for approval of a new Welding Technology program.

Approval for CTE program recertification is a two-step process that includes a self-study of all program components, including curriculum alignment to the Standards, followed by an external review. The external review is a comprehensive program analysis that involves many stakeholders, including business representatives, parents, students, teachers and



administrators from OCM BOCES and its component school districts.

On May 1, external review processes were completed for the OCM BOCES Computer and Construction Technology and Health Occupations Technology programs. Overwhelmingly, stakeholder responses were very positive with many individuals commenting on how impressed they were with the programs. Some recommendations were provided and will be incorporated into the programs.

Completing the program approval and recertification process allows students the option of earning a CTE endorsements on their high school diploma if they meet the requirements of passing the course and an industry-based assessment and completing a student project.

BOCES holds "Preparing Students for their Future" showcase



On Thursday, May 8, 2014, dozens of educational professionals from Central New York gathered at the OCM BOCES Administration Building to attend a workshop and showcase of programs related to options available for their students, organized by the BOCES Special Education Department.

Bob Leslie provided an overview about the Career Development Program, and then representatives from Onondaga Community College and Tompkins Cortland Community College spoke about student options for higher learning. Additionally, representatives from ACCES VR and Liberty Resources were on hand to discuss alternatives for special needs students.

social needs programs and employment organizations.

On Thursday, May 1, 2014, OCM BOCES hosted the Healthier Central New York Challenge at the Rodax 8 building conference center. The event was a collaborative effort of Healthy Schools NY programs at OCM, OHM and TST BOCES, Action for Healthy Kids, Cornell University Cooperative Extension, the American Dairy Association and Dairy Council, Dash NY, Fuel up to Play 60 and Hunger Solutions New York.



Mary Joan McLarney, a Registered Dietician/Nutritionist with the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Northeast Regional Office, presented about the organization's new competitive foods regulations and Kathryn Hoy, of the Cornell Center for Behavioral Economics in Child Nutrition Programs, discussed smarter lunchrooms in schools.

The event was designed to provide assistance and ideas for local food service personnel, school district administrators and district staff.

Stacy McNeill is the OCM BOCES Healthy Schools NY coordinator and as such, works extensively with school district personnel regarding federal, state and local wellness guidelines.
