OCM holds ribbon cuttings for two new programs



Thousands of OCM BOCES Career and Technical Education (CTE), Special Education and Alternative Education students began their 2014-15 school year on Wednesday, September 3, 2014. Through its Student Services division, OCM BOCES provides programs and services for students of all ages and abilities.

This year, OCM BOCES was proud to welcome students in two exciting new programs, an embedded CTE Media Marketing Communications program at WCNY and Innovation Tech High School in Liverpool. OCM BOCES held ribbon cutting ceremonies for both programs in mid-

September to celebrate the unique opportunities afforded to local students through the programs.

The innovative, new, hands-on Media Marketing Communications program at WCNY, is one of OCM BOCES' three embedded CTE programs, through which high school juniors and seniors gain an in-depth overview of their field through placement in an actual work environment outside of school.

Innovation Tech, created out of recognition that students need to be prepared with 21st Century skills for life and work in our changing world, is the first New Tech school in Central New York. Innovation Tech provides an empowering culture, with relevant, student-driven learning that embraces modern technology and the global environment in which we live. There are more than 130 New Tech schools in 23 states across the country.

"We were fortunate to have some very special supporters help us at our ribbon cutting ceremonies," said District Superintendent Jody Manning. "New York State Senator John Defrancisco attended WCNY's cer-

emony and Assemblyman Al Stirpe was at our Innovation Tech ceremony. We are very fortunate for their support to gain funding to start Innovation Tech. We were also honored that our new New York State deputy commissioner, Cosimo Tangorra, debuted at the Innovation Tech Ribbon cutting.

Deaf/Hard of Hearing students create Deaf Awarenss Week activities



In celebration of Deaf Awareness Week, which was September 22 through September 26, students in Ms. Austin's American Sign Language class, put together a variety of fun learning activities. Activities were designed by students in the OCM BOCES Deaf and Hard of Hearing Program for the purpose of educating Solvay High School staff and students about Deaf people and Deaf Culture.

One of the activities involved the students researching interesting facts about Deaf people and then putting the facts on the morning announcements. The ASL/Deaf and Hard Of Hearing students also came up with a sign for the day, which was then signed on the morning announcements. Additionally, students also taught a basic sign language class for other students outside of the school day.

One of the most engaging activities, a "Deaf Challenge,"

was done to offer hearing students a glimpse into hearing loss. For the activity, the American Sign Language class set up a booth in the cafeteria during 5th, 6th and 7th periods and gave hearing students the opportunity to experience how it would feel to have a mild hearing loss, just as some of their peers. The hearing students were given ear plugs to simulate





a mild hearing loss and they were asked to wear the ear plugs for their lunch period and to have conversations as they normally would. The students got to experience the frustrations and accomplishments that students in the Deaf and hard of hearing program have to face every day.

More than 100 students participated in the "Deaf Challenge" and completed surveys explaining their experiences. The activities through Deaf Awareness week brought together the hearing and Deaf students, helping the students to better understand what it is like to live with a hearing loss.
