Commissioner's Update

New York State Education Department Monday, October 26, 2015 Since our last meeting I've continued my statewide tour to talk with students, teachers, school board members, superintendents, principals, Deans and staff from higher education institutes, business officials, BOCES, from small cities to our large; from rural to urban.

 A wide range of discussion but Common Core Standards, Testing and Evaluations/APPR are the dominant topics.

What's next: Common Core Learning Standards

- We launched the NYS P-12 Common Core Learning Standards survey AIMHighNY on Wednesday, October 21 and have received over 4,500 unique visitors.
- We will be reviewing the survey data with various groups representing teachers, parents, students, Higher Education Institutes, school board members, educational administrators and business and workforce representatives. Recommended next steps will be presented to the Board.
- Recommendations which will also be shared with the Governor's Task Force.
- Participated in the Governor's first Common Core Task Force meeting (executive session). Discussed the importance of community engagement.

What's next: NYS Assessments

- SED has contracted with a new vendor.
- Work is underway to significantly increase educator participation to ensure the items/passages are:
 - 1. grade level appropriate;
 - 2. presented at a readability level that is grade appropriate;
 - 3. within grade-level expectations;
 - 4. fair and appropriately measure the learning standards approved by the Board of Regents for such grades and subjects; and
 - of a correct length to ensure that adequate and appropriate time is given to students for the administration of such assessments.

Changes for the Spring 2016 3-8 Assessments

- The Spring 2016 Grade 3-8 tests will contain fewer test questions in ELA and math.
- Educators will have a role in selecting passages and items as well as in constructing the forms.
- Test data was released earlier than in previous years.
- In addition, 50 percent of the questions from the 2015 test were released. Next year, there will be as full a release as possible and as early as possible.
- Department has developed a tool kit to support the communication of the value and importance of annual testing to schools and communities. This resource will be shared with superintendents, school board members and principals.
- Review the way teachers access data to make certain it is teacher friendly and can be used in the most productive manner as well as review how parents receive data to make certain that it accurately portrays their child's performance.

Evaluation

- Review of the growth model is underway.
- Appeals process for growth score advanced by the Board is being utilized by teachers.
- Nearly 200 Hardship Waivers approved related to 3012-d APPR plans (with close to 90 pending).
 Hardship Waivers for 3012-d evaluation plan deadline is October 30.
- Have approved over 200 assessments to be used with SLOs.
- Waivers for independent observers for rural schools

The New York State P-12 Common Core Learning Standards are not:

- assessments
- evaluations
- curriculum

The survey provides an opportunity for every New Yorker to go online, review each standard and comment on what is liked, not liked, or offer a suggestion for a change to a particular standard.

The survey is not a referendum on the standards. It is intended to:

- increase awareness and understanding of New York's current standards in ELA and math; and
- gather actionable feedback from New Yorkers in order to adjust and improve the standards

The Common Core Learning Standards

The Move to Common Core

Whether they want to go to college or straight into the workplace, our students need to be able to think critically and solve complex problems.

In 2010, the Board of Regents adopted more rigorous, college and career-readiness standards to help ensure our schools are preparing all children for success upon graduation from high school.

Why Common Core?

- They help all children—no matter who they are—learn the same skills.
- They are clear expectations for what your child should know and be able to do in key areas: reading, writing, speaking and listening, language and mathematics.
- If you know what these expectations are, then you can work with your child's teacher and help your child prepare.

ELA/Literacy

- ✓ Read both non-fiction and fiction
- ✓ Learn about the world by reading
- ✓ Read more challenging material closely
- ✓ Discuss reading using evidence
- ✓ Write non-fiction using evidence
- ✓ Increase academic vocabulary

Mathematics

- ✓ Focus: learn more about fewer key topics
- ✓ Build skills within and across grades
- ✓ Develop speed and accuracy
- ✓ Really know it, really do it
- ✓ Use it in the real world

Navigating the Survey


- Demographic Information
 - Before starting the survey, you must answer a few demographic questions and agree to the terms and conditions
 - Demographic information CANNOT be used to identify survey respondents
 - Information will help inform adjustments to the standards



Navigating the Survey


The Survey

- Standards are arranged by subject and grade level
- To review a standard, click the plus sign beside the standard to view more detailed information
- Browse standards within a subject and grade level or search for a particular concept by entering it in the search bar on the top left
- Respondents do not have to comment on every standard—just on the standards about which they wish to provide feedback



Survey Feedback

- Once the survey closes…
 - > Teams of New York educators, administrators, parents, and content experts in all grade levels will evaluate and review comments provided about specific standards
 - Any changes recommended by these teams will be presented to the New York Board of Regents for consideration
 - Changes to the standards would not be implemented until the 2016-17 school year or later
