



New Programs for Henry CTE students in Fall 2013

Beginning in the Fall of 2013, students in the Syracuse area will have the option of exploring two new careers as part of their high school curriculum. Through its Career and Technical Education Programs, the OCM BOCES Henry Campus will begin offering welding technology and physical therapy professions programs for high school juniors and seniors.

In September of 2012, a similar welding program was introduced for CTE students at the OCM BOCES McEvoy Campus. That program was very well-received and experienced the largest number of students ever for the first year of new CTE program at OCM BOCES.

In Central New York, there is currently a high demand for welders. Students completing the OCM BOCES welding program will become industry certified, providing them with the knowledge and technical skills to prepare them for positions as entry-level welders or advanced placement in post-secondary education.

The employment outlook for skilled physical therapy assistants is expected to increase over 43 percent through 2020.

Demand for physical therapy services is expected to increase in response to the health-care needs of an aging population. The physical therapy course will give students the knowledge and technical skills needed for an entry-level position in the Physical Therapy (PT) field, as well as offer a path to entering higher education in a PT assistant college program.

The physical therapy and welding programs are both two-year programs for high school juniors and seniors. The physical therapy program will be located at the Strength in Motion Physical Therapy office in East Syracuse.

Dear staff;

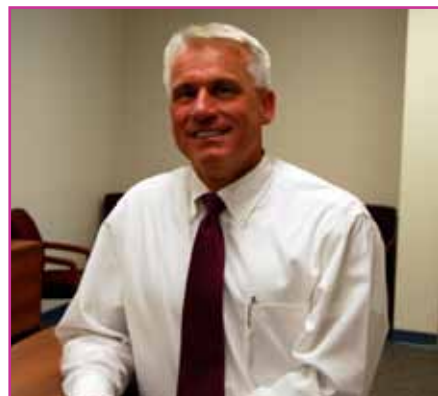

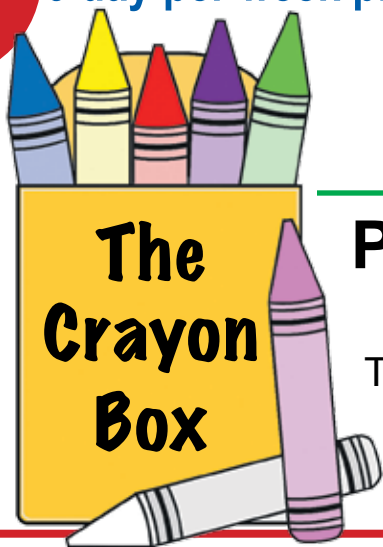

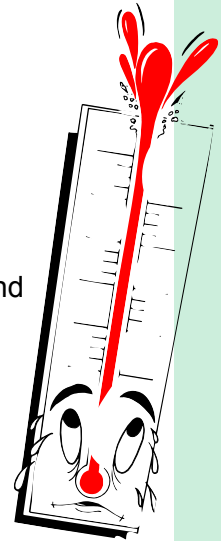

Automotive Technology students take second place in Ford/AAA competition

Congratulations to Erick Dodge's automotive technology students, Joshua Hildreth, from the Baldwinsville Central School District and Tyler Shepard from the Cazenovia Central School District for recently placing second in the Ford/AAA Student Auto Skills Competition held at Morrisville State College on May 14.

To qualify for the hands-on competition at Morrisville, students had to take a written exam. Only 10 of the highest scoring two-person teams in the state qualified for the hands-on competition.



Students worked in their teams to diagnose and repair ten intentional automotive problems on identical cars in just 90 minutes.

For their second-place finish Hildreth and Shepard each received a trophy and several scholarships, including \$1,500 from the Ford Asset program and \$5,000 from Universal Technical Institute.

26 local Hispanic students attend PRHYLI through OCM BOCES



Through the OCM BOCES RBERN (Regional Bilingual Education Resource Network,) 26 local Hispanic students recently had the opportunity to attend the 23rd Annual Puerto Rican Hispanic Youth Leadership Institute (PRHYLI) in Albany, NY. The institute introduces Hispanic high school students to the state's legislative process and civic issues affecting the Latino community, while fostering such skills as debate, citizenship and leadership. It is a collaborative effort among regional RBERNS, the NYS Education Office of Bilingual Education and Foreign Language Studies, the NYC Department of Education, ASPIRA of NY, Inc., and the NYS Assembly's Hispanic Task Force.

The students were selected from nine mid-state high schools to form the Syracuse Delegation: Cicero-North Syracuse High – Lauren Ramos; Fowler High – Ana Díaz Cruz, Eddie Guzmán, Janice Martínez, Karelyn Vávquez, Neyshmaire Meléndez, Magares Rojas, and Abigail Rivera; Marcellus High – Anetxy Barnes and Kelsey Rodríguez Doran; SCSD: Syracuse Central Institute of Technology – Jacob Delgado, Rosalía Hernández, Deanna Martínez, Gabriel Mustell, Jenny Chafía, Jenice Chafía, and Thalia Colón; Henninger High – Alia Anamaria; Jamesville-Dewitt High – Ana Carolina Piedra; Proctor High – Jennifer Difo and Stiven Difo; Ithaca High – Maria Porrás Torres, Sophia Escobedo, Lilia Escobedo, and Wesley Rodríguez; and Solvay High – Kevin Vreeland. Students were chaperoned by Ofelia Anamaria, Barb Bergman, and Melba De Jesus, led by Sally Doran from the OCM BOCES RBERN. Students trained together at OCC in areas directly linked to the NYS Social Studies Standards, with the goal of being prepared to carry out a mock assembly while practicing leadership skills.

Approximately 200 students from nine total delegations across the state met for the culminating three-day event earlier this spring. This year's team building and team leadership activity was led by Giselle O. Martin-Kniep, President of Lerner-Centered Initiatives, Ltd. and Communities for Learning: Leading Lasting Change. Students were split into groups, given guidelines and asked to research "Can we create a future without waste?" Their challenge was to create a multimedia presentation that would inform, inspire and change the way people think about the waste they produce by "up-cycling" and learning to lead others in appreciating the need for a zero waste lifestyle.

Once in the Assembly Chambers of the State Capitol building, the group debated five NYS bills currently before the Assembly. During the awards banquet that followed, 30 seniors were awarded scholarships on a competitive basis for their achievements and performance. Syracuse Delegation had four winners: Maria Porrás, Deanna Martínez, Lauren Ramos, and Sophia Escobedo. In addition, one student per delegation was nominated "outstanding delegate" and from those nine, the "Delegate of the year" is chosen by a select panel of evaluators over the course of the weekend; our Maria Porrás was chosen! What an honor!

Students were then escorted to the adult conference, Somos Uno – an organization dedicated to the dialog of Hispanic issues and policy making representing all aspects of government, business, and community – to hear NYS Assemblymen speak. Rounding out the weekend, students had several more educational opportunities to learn about the Hispanic Scholarship Fund, Latin music in the new world by Dr. José Cruz and hear a panel of PRHYLI alumni speak.
