D. Consider and evaluate the potential moral and legal consequences of decision-making

These standards are the revised version of the Interstate School Leaders Licensure Consortium (ISLLC) Standards for School Leaders. Originally written in 1996, this revision has been updated. The Wallace Foundation has been promoting them. These standards are intended to guide state and local standards for school leaders.
