

### **Framing the Learning When Presenting Information**

During December and January we're going to be focusing on some ways to ensure that the presentation of new information to our students is as effective as possible. There are tried and true methods that many of us experienced as learners that we now use as teachers when introducing new material, such as lectures, demonstrations, discussions, reading, videos, and guest speakers. This week, we've attached a compilation of some fundamental guidelines to remind us how important it is to "Frame the Learning" for the students. Never should we just present new information. We have to get learners ready to receive the new information, we have to make sure that the learners interact with the new learning during the presentation, and we have to make sure that learners process the new information.



**Demonstrations and Beyond**

We demonstrate things to our students all the time. It's a common method of introducing a new skill or idea. We demonstrate in all disciplines and content areas: lay-ups, thesis statements, division, map-reading, cooking, dissection, posture, technique, etc. This week, we've included some simple tips to increase the effectiveness of demonstrations. Most importantly, our students ought to process what they have observed. Layering on another method, the "think-aloud," is a great way to not only demonstrate the skill but also to demonstrate the thinking process involved when one is using the skill. 





**Activity Afternoon and Night**





**This Week's Article: Lectures and Discussion Partners**

Continuing our series on lectures, the attached compilation suggests some ways to effectively use examples in our lectures. As you read it, you'll see that both examples and nonexamples are

stressed. Additionally, you'll find mention of the importance of multiple representations of new terms/vocabulary. When you focus on new words with your students, try not to rely on dictionary definitions alone. It is through linguistic and nonlinguistic representations, as well as examples and nonexamples, that students really learn new words. This is all the more true for specialized meaning of words in some of our content areas. 
**PTG Meeting**



### The Big 6: A Research/Information Literacy Approach

Each year we ask our students to conduct all sorts of research. We have small research efforts and we have big research projects that take weeks and weeks. Yet, we don't have a common research model that we consistently teach our students to use. Might our students have an easier job when researching if we all had common expectations for research and used a common language? Indeed, it not only would be easier for our students, but it might be easier for teachers, too. One commonly used research/information literacy approach is called the Big6. Developed by Mike Eisenberg and Bob Berkowitz, the Big6 is the most commonly used approach to teaching information and technology skills in the world. It is an information and technology literacy model and curriculum, implemented in thousands of schools at all levels. Some people call the Big6 an information problem-solving approach because with the Big6, students are able to handle any problem, assignment, decision or task. Because the Big6 is a problem-solving approach, it is completely parallel to the scientific method and other similar approaches. The district library/media specialists have investigated the Big6 and will continue to explore the possible application of the Big6 to our JDMS research instruction.

### This Week's Article: Analogies & Metaphors

Last week, the attached reading suggested ways to effectively use examples and nonexamples. This week's article encourages us to use metaphors and analogies with our lectures and examples as a way of further using examples and nonexamples. Marzano (2001) demonstrated that the effective use of metaphors, analogies, and other examples can have an incredible impact on student understanding. He made four points about the importance of identifying similarities and differences:

1. Presenting students with explicit guidance in identifying similarities and differences enhances students' understanding of and ability to use knowledge.
2. Asking students to independently identify similarities and differences enhances students' understanding of and ability to use knowledge.
3. Representing similarities and differences in graphic or symbolic form enhances students' understanding of and ability to use knowledge.
4. Identification of similarities and differences can be accomplished in a variety of ways. The identification of similarities and differences is a highly robust activity.

### Literature Circles with Ben Mikaelson

If you entered Room 102 or Room 103 recently you would see sixth grade students actively engaged in literature circles. You would hear sixth grade students talking about the author, story plot, and making personal connections to the characters and their actions. The theme of the literature circles is Ben Mikaelson books. The literature circle groups are enjoying *Stranded*, *Countdown*, *Rescue Josh McGuire*, *Sparrow Hawk Red*, *Touching Spirit Bear*, and *Pete*. The literature circles will conclude with group presentations on Thursday, January 24th. The *Touching Spirit Bear* group is very excited about the 2008 release of *Ghost of Spirit Bear* (the sequel). By the way, Ben Mikaelson will be here at JDMS, working with 6th, 7th, and 8th graders on April 8th.
