





SNAPSHOT OF BOCES SERVICES FOR

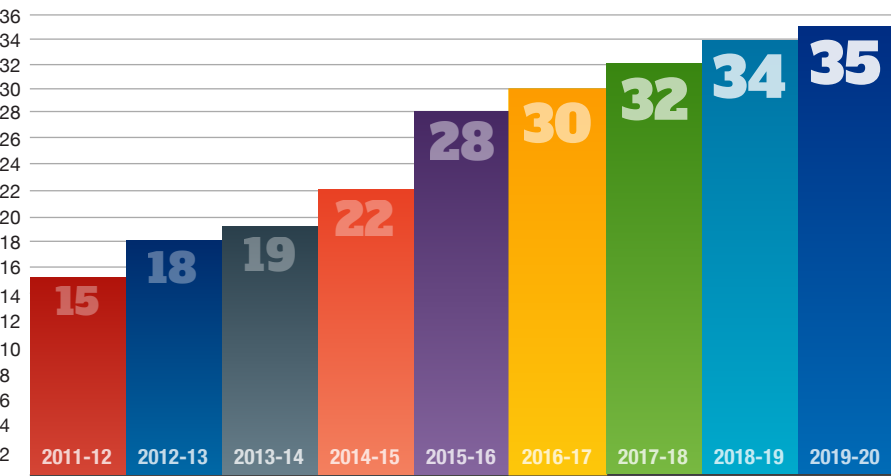
Career & Technical Education

New York State's approval process for Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs has raised the quality and rigor of courses that prepare students for employment and postsecondary study. Approved programs lead to an industry-recognized credential or certificate at the postsecondary level, or an associate or baccalaureate degree. CTE courses offer students the opportunity to apply academic concepts to real-world situations and prepare them for industry-based assessments or certifications. They have the opportunity to earn college credit or advanced standing while still in high school and take part in work-based learning opportunities where they demonstrate mastery of skills essential in the workplace. In addition, our Technically Endorsed programs, embedded in area businesses, have been recognized by *District Administration* magazine as one of more than 30 national innovative programs.

OCM BOCES & Chittenango = Student Success



In his first year with the OCM BOCES Auto Collision Technology program, Chittenango junior Jacob Gronau has jumped right in with a pair of challenges that put his newly minted skills to the test. Jacob, for example, was part of a team that recently installed interior parts in a Humvee owned by the Chittenango Police Department. For another project, Jacob and his classmates began the hard work of a “resto-mod” — a modified restoration — of a vintage Yamaha motorcycle. Both projects have been engaging for students because they involve communicating with real-world customers about paint schemes, deadlines, and other expectations.

“Jacob came to OCM BOCES because he simply wanted to learn more about repairing cars, getting out dents, and auto collision in general,” Instructor Matt McGivney said. “I’ve been happy to teach him more about this.”

In a program where it is important to pay attention to details, Jacob has begun the work of extending his skills in areas such as body repair, replacement, and painting and finishing techniques. In the motorcycle project, for example, Jacob is teamed up with a classmate to strip paint from the gas tank and side covers. They are also working with the motorcycle’s owner, referred to as “the customer,” to determine the best paint scheme to use once they apply sufficient primer to the metal and fiberglass components.

McGivney said Jacob has learned to take his time with various tasks to give each job the attention it needs. Jacob also takes initiative by walking around the garage to learn from his peers. His favorite part about the program? “The hands-on activities,” Jacob said.

After high school, Jacob hopes to start his career with a full-time job in an auto collision shop. McGivney hopes his student will look back on his high school years and say, “Wow, I learned this in Auto Collision at OCM BOCES.”

Did You Know?

All school librarians in the Chittenango Central School District co-hosted the first Mentors Across Borders professional learning day on Oct. 8. The morning was spent in the Chittenango High School library, and the afternoon was divided between the middle school and elementary schools. All Chittenango school librarians are participating in the School Library System Mentoring program — one as a mentor, and three as mentees. This program involves five professional learning opportunities and a book study.
