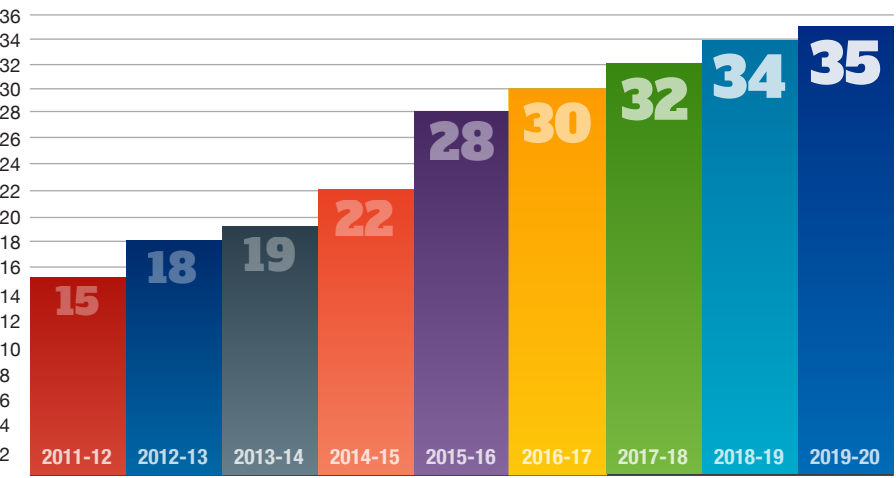
Career & Technical Education

New York State's approval process for Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs has raised the quality and rigor of courses that prepare students for employment and postsecondary study. Approved programs lead to an industry-recognized credential or certificate at the postsecondary level, or an associate or baccalaureate degree. CTE courses offer students the opportunity to apply academic concepts to real-world situations and prepare them for industry-based assessments or certifications. They have the opportunity to earn college credit or advanced standing while still in high school and take part in work-based learning opportunities where they demonstrate mastery of skills essential in the workplace. In addition, our Technically Endorsed programs, embedded in area businesses, have been recognized by *District Administration* magazine as one of more than 30 national innovative programs.

In 2019, nearly 440 seniors from OCM BOCES’ component districts were eligible to earn CTE endorsements on their high school diplomas.


Number of classrooms in school district buildings that host BOCES Special Education Programs

The OCM BOCES Special Education Transitional Program at Long Branch Elementary School has had a tremendous impact on second-grader Bryce Marshall. In the two years Bryce has been in the program, his teacher, Lauren Grimmertt, has witnessed him grow socially, emotionally, behaviorally, and academically. Thanks to what she calls a “team approach” that includes his family, administrators, teachers, teaching assistants, and the classroom social worker, Bryce has benefited from the program tremendously.

“I am so proud of Bryce, his success and his hard work,” Grimmertt said. “Bryce is well on his way to building the skills needed to thrive in the general education environment.”

The Transitional Program strives to give students strategies and skills to cope and address their needs, while also providing them with academic skills to be successful. Bryce, for example, has become so confident in his reading skills that he now calls it his favorite subject — after recess.

Bryce’s parents are thrilled with the progress he has made in the program, noting that his success in school has translated to success at home. His parents have also seen the advancements he has made in math and reading comprehension, and credit this improvement to his time in the program.

“Since Bryce started with OCM BOCES, he has become more focused and more excited about his work,” said Bryce’s father, Jeff Marshall. “He continues to grow academically and personally with BOCES, and it makes me very happy to see my son eager and willing to learn!”

Bryce’s mother, Kelly, agrees.

“Bryce loves reading and writing now and shows improvement in everything he sets his mind to,” she said. “He is focused and loves going to school. I am very happy with the program.”
