Career & Technical Education

New York State’s approval process for Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs has raised the quality and rigor of courses that prepare students for employment and postsecondary study. Approved programs lead to an industry-recognized credential or certificate at the postsecondary level, or an associate or baccalaureate degree. CTE courses offer students the opportunity to apply academic concepts to real-world situations and prepare them for industry-based assessments or certifications. They have the opportunity to earn college credit or advanced standing while still in high school and take part in work-based learning opportunities where they demonstrate mastery of skills essential in the workplace. In addition, our Technically Endorsed programs, embedded in area businesses, have been recognized by *District Administration* magazine as one of more than 30 national innovative programs.

In 2022, 294 seniors from OCM BOCES’ component districts were eligible to earn CTE endorsements on their high school diplomas, including Marathon students Gerado Baez, Connor Brown, Ryan Eaton, Kayla Ellerson, Aidan Hafer, Trevor Hurlbert, Paige Hurlburt, Alanna Jamison, Cailin Martin, Timothy Morehouse, Ethan Morrison, Lacie Peck, Timothy Potter Jr., Darrion Stiles, and ElijahLee Teal.

OCM BOCES & Marathon = Student Success

Food has always been a big part of life for twin sisters Paige and Morgan Simmons, who both joined the OCM BOCES Culinary & Pastry Arts program last year, as juniors. The girls “grew up in the kitchen,” they said, cooking and baking since they were old enough to hold a spoon. Both are familiar faces at the Freeville Farmers’ Market, where they help their grandma sell homemade pies, baked goods and home-grown vegetables.

“This culinary program appealed to me because I grew up in the kitchen and wanted to know what skills I was doing right and what I was doing wrong,” Paige said.

“I wanted to venture out and try something different compared to traditional school,” Morgan said. “I also grew up in a kitchen, so this program felt like home.”

For culinary teacher Madison Eagan, the girls are a wonderful asset to the program. She attributed much of their success to “motivation, ambition and friendly attitudes.”

“They are very organized, they act as team players, and they are very knowledgeable about how a kitchen is run,” she added.

Over time, Morgan has gravitated toward savory cooking, performing exceptionally well in a recent soup cook-off challenge. Paige is drawn to baking, impressing her teachers and peers with a delicious caramelized chocolate chip cookie.

“This is a life skill they will always have under their belts,” Eagan said. “It is a passion they hold close to home.”

Teaching Assistant Eliza Vitale said the girls’ personalities will help them succeed in whatever they do. She described them as bright, hard-working, full of good humor and respectful to others.

“It’s been a pleasure teaching and getting to know them,” Vitale said.
