
Career & Technical Education

New York State's approval process for Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs has raised the quality and rigor of courses that prepare students for employment and postsecondary study. Approved programs lead to an industry-recognized credential or certificate at the postsecondary level, or an associate or baccalaureate degree. CTE courses offer students the opportunity to apply academic concepts to realworld situations and prepare them for industry-based assessments or certifications. They have the opportunity to earn college credit or advanced standing while still in high school and take part in work-based learning opportunities where they demonstrate mastery of skills essential in the workplace. In addition, our Technically Endorsed programs, embedded in area businesses, have been recognized by *District Administration* magazine as one of more than 30 national innovative programs.

Chad Cayea has made significant progress since he first joined the OCM BOCES STARS Alternative High School in January of 2022. His grades have steadily improved. He gets along well with his classmates and teachers. He appreciates getting extra help with his schoolwork. In fact, Chad often serves as a role model to his peers because he likes to dive into assignments and contribute to class discussions.

Chad, now a junior, attributes the change to feeling welcomed and comfortable in a small-school environment.

"My favorite things about BOCES are the classes, the teachers and the students," he said. "I get along with everyone."

His science teacher, Sean Coppola, said Chad's turnaround was reflected last year in an Environmental Science project that focused on several types of green energy. Chad "went above and beyond to make the presentation incredibly detailed and visually pleasing," Coppola said. "He always shows an interest and determination to succeed."

Chad also has the "utmost respect" for his classmates and teachers, Coppola added. It was a compliment echoed by Wendy Lloyd, the school's social worker, who called Chad "a pleasure to have in our program."

After high school, Chad plans to join the U.S. military so he can serve his country and follow in the footsteps of his grandfather, an Army veteran. If he continues to show the determination and respect he is exemplifying at STARS, he will likely succeed in any profession, his teachers said.

"Chad is taking advantage of every opportunity here at STARS," said Jay Kresge, his ELA teacher. "I have had the opportunity to teach Chad in three different classes, and he always conducts himself with self-control, manners and effort. I have no doubt Chad will do great things moving forward."

Did You Know?

This past summer, for the second year in a row, Mid-State RBERN supported the English as a New Language (ENL) Summer Learning program in the North Syracuse Central School District. Fifty students in grades 1 through 6 participated, and 19 languages were represented. The purpose was to engage students in learning experiences related to nature and animals while supporting language maintenance in both the home language and English. At the culmination of the program, students created books related to the content. The assessment data showed students maintained their proficiency and, in most cases, showed evidence of growth in their English language acquisition.
