Students in the Seven Valleys New Tech Academy Interact Club are putting in a lot of volunteer hours to help their community. 


debris from the Tioughnioga River and other bodies of water.

### Big impact: Supporting English Language Learners is the mission of RBERNs

As of today, there are an estimated 256,736 English Language Learners (ELLs) in New York State. That number has been growing – fast. Over the past five years, there has been an 18.2% increase in the number of ELLs in New York State.

OCM BOCES is the home of the Mid-State Regional Bilingual Education Network (RBERN), one of eight RBERNs across the state. The mission of RBERNs is to help school communities create educational environments that are safe, equitable and culturally relevant for ELLs. As a network, the RBERNs work with the New York State Education Department's Office of Bilingual Education and World Languages to provide technical assistance and professional learning to 732 school districts, 351 charter schools

### "Let's GEO!" project inspired by math and art

The first step in a long-term project got underway this fall at Innovation Tech, where students enjoyed the warmth of a sun-splashed morning to chalk out colorful, symmetrical designs on a sidewalk in front of their school. Students in this 10th-grade class, called GeoDesign, are learning simultaneously about geography and design, which have overlapping vocabulary and concepts. On this day, after studying tessellation-inspired art, students used color schemes, artist chalk and lines of symmetry to outline and color in their own creations. Facilitator **Christine Alexander** said the project was part of a project-based learning initiative called "Let's Get Everyone Outside" or "Let's GEO," with a bigger, culminating community event planned for later in the year. In the GeoDesign class, she said, students are quickly learning that common vocabulary, such as a line, "is very relevant to both art and math, but the application is different."



### Adult Education partners with Guthrie Cortland Medical Center for patient advocacy class

In a partnership with Guthrie Cortland Medical Center, the OCM BOCES Adult

Education division is collaborating on a "workforce transformation" grant offered by the Care Compass Network. This grant has allowed the Adult Education team to design a new, 10week patient advocacy class that is being held at the offices of Access to Independence of Cortland County, Inc. Adult Education Director **Mari Ukleya** said the pilot program, which included input from many Cortland-area community agencies, offers a mix of inperson and hybrid learning for its participants, who are learning the



content they need to get ready for the National Patient Advocate Certification Exam, as well as job-readiness skills. The pilot is part of a three-year, \$200,000 grant awarded in January of 2020. Curriculum development was completed in July, and the first class began in September. The next session will begin in January 2021.

### Students share kindness, gratitude in FOR Club at Innovation Tech

Students in the Friends of Rachel (FOR) Club at Innovation Tech are promoting a spirit of gratitude at their school to help alleviate the stress and uncertainty surrounding the pandemic. In October, students put together a bulletin board full of "positivity pumpkins" that shared anonymous compliments with their classmates. The pumpkins promoted the club's monthlong theme of kindness. In November, appropriate for Thanksgiving, students filled out "leaves of gratitude" for a tree that promoted an "attitude of gratitude."





### Rosamond Gifford Zoo receives a big boost from the CNYRIC

Early last year, CNYRIC e-Learning Coordinator **Amy Keesey** met with the director and education coordinator of the Rosamond Gifford Zoo at Burnet Park to show them

how e-Learning would increase their audience. Initially, the zoo planned to roll it out this fall. However, COVID forced the zoo to close, so it became a priority to get it off the ground. With Amy's assistance, they were able to launch the program over the summer and were added to the content of the <u>Center for Interactive Learning and</u> <u>Collaboration</u>, an online video



conferencing catalog. The Rosamond Gifford Zoo is now offering sessions through Zoom for our regional schools as well as schools across the United States as a result of Amy's efforts. Topics include *"Species Survival," "Beastly Builders"* and *"Animal Myths Busted!"* Districts in our region have begun to register for programs for multiple grade levels.


# More from the CNYRIC: Pandemic brings changes to services

Several vendors that provide services to our districts through the Central New York Regional Information Center (CNYRIC) have modified their products to support the hybrid model of in-person and remote learning for our students.

CNYRIC Director **Pam Mazzaferro** shared with the OCM BOCES Board of Education that SchoolTool, for example, now includes attendance codes for remote learners and reporting options for homeroom vs. period-based attendance. The CNYRIC is supporting students' at-home access to the internet with MiFi hotspots and Kajeet. Finally, the COVID screening app you use each day at OCM BOCES staff is also being used for employees in seven districts. All were part of a concerted effort by CNYRIC staff to give as much assistance as possible to districts as they worked to reopen schools this past fall. # Exploring the outdoors — the perfect classroom for New Vision Environmental Science students
