The holiday spirit is alive and well amid all the incredible "kindness" activities going on across OCM BOCES as part of Rachel's Challenge. The long list of activities is impressive, especially since students and staff involved in the "Friends of Rachel" (FOR) clubs are exceptionally committed to promoting a culture of kindness in our schools. Highlights include:



- Students at our Cortlandville Campus are filling up "Snack Packs" with donated food and sending them home each Friday with three dozen students. They are also working hard to create a clothing closet for those in need.
- At Innovation Tech and REACH, students are ringing the bells for the Salvation Army and "lighting up" the hallways with paper Christmas bulbs that share ways to be kind. They are also delivering candy canes to students that include kind messages.
- At Cortland Alternative School, a "Caught Red Handed" campaign collects nominations for acts of kindness, which in turn results in a red hand on the wall and prizes for three-peat winners.



Speaking of David Daignault... David was at a holiday celebration Dec. 14 at our Thompson Road Campus with a large group of OCM BOCES administrators and Board of Education members when one of the participants starting choking on a piece of beef. David took notice and performed the Heimlich maneuver until the



food broke free. He and most of the Safety Officers within his program are certified in CPR/AED through the American Heart Association —training that also includes the Heimlich. Daignault and his team regularly provide CPR training at OCM and within the components. Daignault downplayed his life-saving assistance, saying, "I'm just glad it had a happy outcome and everyone could go home and have a Merry Christmas."

Making Jewelry, Helping Others

Students in the first-ever Jewelry Class at Seven Valleys New Tech Academy in Cortland held a winter jewelry sale Dec. 7 to benefit local and national charities. Students had spent the previous six weeks exploring the question: "How can we, as jewelry crafters and entrepreneurs, make and sell our works of art so that we can grow a business with a positive community impact?" During this time, they made a variety of handcrafted jewelry that included beading, wirewrapping, rings, and earrings. They also researched and contacted the charities of their choice to prepare for the sale.



The students chose to partner with one national charity, the American Red

Cross, and one local charity called "I Have Wings," a breast cancer foundation that supports women and their families. Students raised more than \$260 for the two charities in their evening sale and held an additional sale for their classmates. Facilitator Jake Melnyk, a jewelry maker himself, said the students "were excited that their creativity could have a strong impact in this holiday season."
