As changes unfold, we will be sure to keep you up-to-date on this extremely important topic.

### **Remembering OCM BOCES Board Member Bill Pedrick**

It is with great sadness that OCM BOCES is announcing the death of William A. Pedrick, a six-year member of our OCM BOCES Board of Education. Bill died Feb. 21 at the age of 70, after a long and valiant battle with cancer. He had served on our OCM BOCES Board of Education since 2012, primarily representing the Cortland and Homer school districts.



As many of you know, Bill's commitment to education went far beyond our organization. He had also served as a proud member of the Homer Central School District's Board of Education and



as a dedicated director for the Central New York School Boards Association (CNYSBA). Before his official retirement in 1998, Bill had worked as an adjunct instructor at SUNY Cortland's Academic Support and Achievement Program, which he first joined in 1984. He was also an instructor at Tompkins Cortland Community College.

When he wrote his biography for a second term on the OCM BOCES Board of Education in 2015, Bill described a background that included "writing, editing, marketing and advertising, with a second career experience in college teaching, tutoring and advisement." His own educational achievements included degrees in journalism and communications from SUNY Morrisville and Cortland, respectively, and a degree in developmental education from Appalachian State University. He had also studied at Cornell. His hobbies included writing, editing, photography, adoption advocacy, fundraising, golf and swimming.

OCM BOCES Board President Ann Wright said Bill's educational work and service have been extremely valuable for the OCM BOCES, its Board of Trustees, administration and staff.

"His advocacy for education in several venues was very beneficial for Central New York students, school districts and communities," Wright said. "The varied experiences and training he brought to carry out his duties was significant. It was always informative, and it was always a pleasure to work with him. Bill's friendship and enthusiasm will be greatly missed."

District Superintendent Jody Manning echoed those comments, saying Bill was extremely dedicated to the students in our region.

"This is certainly a big loss for OCM BOCES and the entire education community," Dr. Manning said. "We are very grateful for all the time and effort that Bill contributed to our organization. We will miss his passion, his humor and his deep sense of commitment toward preparing our students for the future."

Our hearts go out to Linda, Bill's wife of 44 years; his daughter, LeeAnne, and all his family and friends.
