Efforts to address the threat of school violence continue to take center stage for OCM BOCES and all of our districts. I recently attended a town hall meeting at Liverpool Middle School that was sponsored by CNYCentral (local television stations 3 & 5). The segment aired live at 7 p.m. May 8. In addition, as you will see below, OCM BOCES hosted a Student Safety Symposium sponsored by Gaggle, a company that offers digital products related to school security. Finally, on a continuing basis, we are having our regular monthly discussions with school superintendents, our regional task force meetings with the district attorney's office, our discussions with the New York State Education Department, and our internal discussions about safety initiatives within OCM BOCES.

I would like to give a special thanks to our employees at the Central New York Regional Information Center who worked tirelessly during the state testing period to address a malicious denial of service (DOS) attack aimed at obstructing our internet connections. This problem, compounded by additional connectivity issues stemming from Questar, the state's testing vendor, made for an exceptionally challenging and difficult week. I am grateful for the extra efforts from our RIC team in addressing these problems with speed and professionalism.

Could you solve a major environmental problem?

Students in our New Vision Environmental Science program in Cortland did just that. **Dakota Kleefeld** (Homer) and **Zane Potts** (Marathon) won a third-





place price and \$250 in the 2018 CNY Innovation Challenge held April 7 at Onondaga Community College. The students converted Styrofoam — a major environmental problem — into a commercial insulation product. In their proposal, the students envisioned community drop-off locations for foam products that would later be chipped into pieces and pressed into boards with a binding agent. Prototypes for this idea utilized cheese wax as the binding agent; one sample added Borax to aid in fire suppression and rodent control. - Submitted by Instructor Chad DeVoe
