I hope all of you had a chance to read my email about our upcoming referendum to purchase the Crown Road Campus. Purchasing this site offers a wonderful opportunity for OCM BOCES to keep a well-designed and well-maintained home for many of our Special Education and Innovative Education students. It also makes sense from a financial perspective. OCM BOCES can end its 32-year lease at the site, take advantage of a sound investment opportunity, and offer long-term savings for our component districts.

As I said in the all-staff email, please mark your calendars for Tuesday, Nov. 19, the date of the public vote. We will be offering four voting locations: Crown Road, Main Campus, Thompson Road (Henry), and Cortlandville (McEvoy). The voting will take place between 10 a.m. and 8 p.m. You are eligible to vote if you are at least 18 years old and have lived in one of our 23 component districts for at least 30 days.

LETRS training focuses on developing stronger readers and writers

OCM BOCES recently hosted 160 teachers and instructional leaders, representing over a dozen school districts, for the first two days of training called Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling (LETRS). These workshops focused on how language, reading, and writing are related to one another and other critical elements most effective in improving reading outcomes overall.



Over the course of the next two months, teachers will focus on what research tells us about how the brain learns to read, and how to translate that research into effective classroom practice that will help students become stronger readers and writers.
