### **OCM BOCES leads the way for CNY Leadership Program**



Good schools depend on good teacher leaders and good administrators. Through its Division of Instructional Support Services, OCM BOCES has begun the Central New York Leadership Development Program (CNYLDP), a joint initiative with Le Moyne College, as part of efforts to support existing leaders and encourage and develop future leaders.

On Monday, December 9, 2013, Dr. Stephanie Wood-Garnett, New York State Education Department (SED) Assistant Commissioner for Teacher and Leader Effectiveness and SED Project Coordinator Melissa Greene, visited the area to learn about OCM BOCES and Le Moyne College's CNYLDP collaboration.

The CNYLDP provides a combination of instruction and coaching/

mentoring for three different audiences: teacher leadership, building leadership, and district leadership. Participants engage in initiatives with colleagues from other school districts, bringing richer ideas that will impact their analysis and problem solving. The format allows weekly feedback from mentors and monthly presentations by adjunct professors who are current practitioners in the field. CNYLDP is designed to complement and integrate ongoing professional development initiatives while providing a sustained focus on leadership development.

During their visit to the area, the Assistant Commissioner and Project Coordinator met with representatives from OCM BOCES, the Fayetteville-Manlius and Liverpool Central School Districts and Le Moyne College to learn about the program. Additionally, the group spent time observing an issue analysis presentation by a first

year team of associates from the Liverpool School District and participated in a year two cohort seminar.

OCM BOCES District Superintendent Jody Manning is pleased the SED is looking at the collaboration as a model. He said, "BOCES is about success...not just the success of students, but of teachers and administrators as well. We believe that this collaborative endeavor will strengthen our area's existing leadership as will nurture future leadership. We are excited to have SED looking at the program as a model for others."

The students were glad to participate and wrote literacy reflection papers citing some of their thoughts.

One student, Tori, met two young refugee twin brothers who came to America just a year ago and were accompanied to the event by a veteran. After the boys had their faces painted, Tori learned that it was the first time they had ever been able to have it done. Tori said, "They were so excited as [I] finished an American Flag on their faces. It was the most memorable part of the day."

She also said, "I had a great time meeting many veterans, who have done their job to keep our country safe."

Another student named Kayleigh met a six year boy who asked to have an American Flag painted on his face. He told her that although his father was on active duty and "I know daddy can't see me, but now I can match him."

Marissa, another student, wrote "When I was at the expo I thought about how my grandpa who was in the coast guard, and how he was on a ship headed to Cuba during the Cuban Missile Crisis. When he talks about it he gets teary eyed and chokes up."

The students did a great job face-painting and learned a great deal about American History at the same time. They came away with an appreciation for their country and for those who served.

## Project Based Learning Projects Showcased







On Tuesday, November 26, students from the OCM BOCES Reach Program at the Lee G. Peters Career Training Center in Liverpool had the opportunity to showcase their knowledge and creativity through their "The Power of Symbols" Project Based Learning Display.

In order to provide a Project Based Learning (PBL) experience for their students, Reach teachers were first trained on PBL by OCM BOCES PBL 101 trainers Patrick Shaw and Joanne Keim. The training received allowed teachers to plan, assess and manage PBL with their students. Teachers were also coached on the implementation of their project idea.

The culminating effort was presented as an "art gallery" of each students' work, with student artists on hand to discuss

their projects with family, friends, school staff and judges. Reach's PBL experience involved students choosing a symbol and researching it to provide write-ups, mathematical transformations and a final display of the symbol. During the exhibit, students presented and explained their work to attendees and were judged on their ability to effectively convey an understanding of the symbol, as well as on their craftsmanship, creativity and amount of effort put forth. Some of the symbols chosen by students included the US Army star, Peace sign, Rainbow Brite, Air Jordan, basketball, Rosie the Rivetor, and more.

OCM BOCES PBL Trainer, Joanne Keim, was impressed with the work that resulted from the project, She said, "When we walked into the public exhibit of the student projects, Patrick and I looked at each other and said, 'WOW!' To see all of the training and coaching come together was rewarding for us." She added, "As we visited each project, we talked to the students and quizzed them on the content. We were impressed by each student's communication skills. [They] were articulate and passionate about the personal symbols they chose and the math content they learned."

Family members also attended the exhibit and were impressed by the students' work. Gina Bisesi, mother of Reach student Aubrey Revette (Rainbow Brite project) said, "All of the kids did a wonderful job. I thought it was a very interesting way to combine creative and academic pathways. I am so proud of Aubrey for standing up and displaying her project. She greeted people as they approached her and explained the mathematics behind the design of her project very well. I am so happy that Aubrey had the opportunity to show how articulate she can be."

During the display, Kurtis Sanborn, a Reach student from the North Syracuse Central School District explained why he chose the symbol he did. He said, "I did the Peace sign because it means something to me. I tried to create peace and quiet and explain the true meaning behind the symbol. The colors are for Jamaica to represent Bob Marley and his involvement with the peace movement. [This project] was fun [and] I learned a lot because I got to pick something that matters to me."

Joanne Keim said that student engagement is one of the biggest benefits of PBL, "Teachers told us stories about particular students and how this project engaged them like no other classroom experience had previously. They said attendance was up due to student interest. Projects like this, and the results we saw and heard about, are what PBL is all about! It is a different way of learning **AND** [it] helps prepare students for their future!" \*\*
