Topping the list is a new, businessembedded program at Tracey Road Equipment that will prepare our students for the high-demand field of heavy equipment operation and repair and diesel technology. Employers like

Tracey Road have become invaluable partners with OCM BOCES because they need a pipeline of skilled, trained workers to make their industries successful. Next year,

when the program begins, students will learn about operating and repairing large equipment such as trucks, bulldozers, backhoes, excavators, and forklifts. They will benefit from an on-site classroom and their own, dedicated work bay to put that knowledge to work. It was wonderful to share the excitement



of this program Feb. 3 when more than 60 parents, students, and other guests stopped by Tracey for our first Open House.

Similarly, on March 3, we will be holding our first Open House at Lockheed Martin. Students and parents will visit the plant in Liverpool to learn about the on-site New Vision Engineering



Professions Program, which started in September. In this two-year program, students are working side-by-side with Lockheed engineers and doing vigorous, college-level work led by a former Syracuse University professor who previously worked for Lockheed Martin. What an amazing opportunity for our students!

Finally, as these cold and cloudy months of winter take hold, I hope you will keep in mind our OCM BOCES theme for the year: *Culture Counts, Wellness Counts*. 


Congratulations to our OCM BOCES Scholastic Art winners!
