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Students from five districts score big in Academic Decathlon Tully takes top honors in Section III Educational Competition



On Saturday, January 24, more than 60 students from the Cazenovia, Liverpool, Tully, West Genesee and Westhill school districts competed in the 2015 New York State Section III Academic Decathlon Competition at Westhill High School. The event is coordinated annually by the Onondaga-Cortland-Madison Board of Cooperative Educational Services (OCM BOCES).

The theme of this year's event, "New Alternatives in Energy: Ingenuity and Innovation," had students battling wits in a series of written tests and an oral relay (Super Quiz) competition. Since it

began as a local academic competition in California in 1968, the event has grown to become an international event for students in grades 9-12. The Decathlon promotes well roundedness by providing competition for each team in several events, including the team-based Super Quiz oral relay and objective tests in art, math, science, music, economics, literature and social science.

Individual students earn medals by subject area, and accumulate points toward their team's total. In this year's competition, the team from Tully (pictured above) won first place for the Super Quiz competition, with a score of 2,583 and first place overall, with a score of 21,525. The team from West Genesee (pictured below right) earned 19,780 total points and took second place while the from Westhill (pictured below left) earned 19,436 points to place third overall in the competition.

These three highest scoring teams will now advance to the New York State Competition, which is taking place on February 27 and 28 at the State University of New York at Brockport. The state winner will go on to represent

New York state in the national competition, scheduled for April 16 through 18 in Garden Grove, California.

From the District Superintendent



Dear staff;

As we are moving into the second semester of the 2014-15 school year, I am feeling the momentum picking up here at OCM BOCES. In just a short time, we will be presenting our initial budget to districts at our 2015 Annual Meeting. Shortly thereafter, our component districts will be requesting the public's approval of their own budgets for the 2015-16 school year.

With budget season rapidly approaching, our school districts are feeling a sense of uneasiness and uncertainty. Since 2009-10, the district's financial state has suffered the consequences of the Gap Elimination Adjustment, which has resulted in the loss of **more than 280 million dollars** in aid for our 23 component districts since the 2010-11 school year.

Even though Governor Cuomo presented his 2015-16 New York State Budget Proposal in late January, very few specifics were made available as to what funding school districts can expect. Without having the details necessary, districts are challenged greatly when making budgeting decisions or projections. I anticipate that many districts will be working out their final budget decisions very close to their May 19 budget votes. I encourage you to become involved in your school district's budget process. Here at BOCES, we will use this newsletter to share information with you about our own budget.

So even though Punxsutawney Phil *did* see his shadow and predicts another six weeks of winter, I can't help feeling as though spring is just around the corner. There are so many great things happening here at BOCES...we are coming into the months of CTE competitions, award ceremonies and graduations from our many programs. We also have our March superintendent's conference day on the 20th, which coincides with the first day of spring. As always, I'm looking forward to spending that day of learning, collaboration and renewal with you all!

School Districts Save Money by Consolidating through BOCES

As an employee of OCM BOCES, you already know that school districts have a long history of working together to provide services collaboratively through the mechanism of Boards of Cooperative Educational Services.

While BOCES were initially designed many decades ago to help small and rural schools come together to provide occupational and special education, the organization has transformed and evolved over the years to offer additional services. In addition to its many well-known cooperative educational programs, OCM BOCES also offers administrative, management, technology and non-instructional services such as cooperative purchasing, and safety and risk management.

Each year, OCM BOCES saves its 23 component districts millions of dollars by coordinating their cooperative purchase of health insurance and workers' compensation coverage, natural gas, electricity, technology equipment, fuel and many other commodities. During 2014, OCM BOCES saved its 23 component districts more than \$52 million through such cooperative initiatives.

"All districts have to pay employees and vendors. They have to buy goods and services and transport students to and from their buildings. And all districts need to heat and cool those buildings," OCM BOCES District Superintendent Jody Manning stated. "But by sharing the cost of these necessities, OCM BOCES districts are saving a great deal of money and providing higher quality services. It is simply a win-win," he added.

The \$52 million saved in 2014 is made up of a combination of cooperative efforts such as cooperative purchasing, a wide area fiber network consortium, an energy cooperative, a health insurance cooperative and a workers' compensation consortium.

The OCM BOCES cooperative purchasing service allows districts to join together and pool quantities of particular commodities for competitive bidding. Cooperative purchasing provides cost savings for districts because vendors typically offer more favorable pricing to districts when commodities are being bid out in greater volume. Additionally, districts may realize savings in other areas since cooperative purchasing does not require them to devote as much of their staff's time, effort, and resources toward procuring items as if they were to do so on their own.
