### **Payroll Transition to Begin** July 1, 2010

The OCM BOCES transition to a semimonthly payroll schedule will take place over the year with there being 25 pay periods during the 2010-11 year. The first payroll payment will be on July 2, 2010 for 12 month employees. After that, all staff will be paid on the 15th and 30th of each month. Beginning in 2011-2012, there will be 24 payroll periods for 12 month employees. For 10 month employees, the first payroll payment for the 2010-11 school year will be on September 15, 2010, with 20 pay periods for the school year.
