911: A Very Special Tribute

OCM BOCES was honored to fly a special flag on Sept. 11 to honor the 2,753 victims of the 2001 terrorist attack. The flag was donated by **Mary Ellen Michalenko**, our highly regarded OCM BOCES hospital school teacher at Upstate Golisano Children's Hospital. Mary Ellen's brother,



Michael Seaman, died in the attack on the World Trade Center. He was working as vice president and partner of Cantor Fitzgerald in One World Trade Center on the 101st floor when the planes hit. The company had the greatest loss of life of any company. Mary Ellen continues to mourn for her brother with her family. "After all these years, we still have tears," she wrote in a recent letter to Dr. Manning, "but laughter and wonderful memories are the mainstay. I have always wanted to donate a flag in Michael's name to OCM BOCES."

Tackling School Safety from all Directions

At OCM BOCES, we are implementing several school safety initiatives that address both our immediate responses to threats as well as long-term efforts to promote the physical and mental well-being of all students. The SSEATs Academies take teachers behind the scenes at the Smithsonian museums and other world-class research facilities throughout the greater Washington, D.C., area. They



combine weeklong training in science pedagogy with content presented by scientists and researchers who are experts in their fields.

Holly attended the SSEAT for Earth's History and Global Change. She experienced private study experiences in the Smithsonian Museum of Natural History, the United States Geological Survey, the National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration, and the Carnegie Institute for Science. She was able to deepen her content knowledge and bring back many resources to share with teachers in our region as they shift towards implementing the Smithsonian Science K-6 curriculum to support transition to the New York State Science Learning Standards. The science curriculum program is serving more than 1,500 classrooms in the region.

Summer school in our OCM BOCES Special Education programs also boomed. Assistant Special Education Director Kim Koch and her leadership team coordinated another wonderful summer for students who qualified for Extended School Year programming. OCM BOCES served 290 students at Roxboro Middle School in the North Syracuse Central School District; 90 students at our Crown Road Campus in Liverpool; and 140 students at the Cortlandville Campus. The program not only helps students maintain and increase their academic knowledge and skills, it also ensures they have opportunities to build social skills and have fun.

2018 Notice of Availability, Asbestos Management Plans

As provided under the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (40 CFR 763), the Onondaga-Cortland-Madison Board of Cooperative Educational Services hereby makes known the steps it has undertaken to comply with AHERA and the availability of asbestos management plans. In 1988, OCM BOCES contracted with the firm of O'Brien & Gere Engineers, Inc. of Syracuse, New York to survey our buildings and construct a management plan for each of our facilities. Mandatory re-inspections have been performed every three years since then. The last re-inspection was conducted in June 2016. Management plans for applicable facilities were updated accordingly. The re-inspection information was submitted to the State Education Department as required. Periodic surveillance is conducted on a sixmonth cycle. The Maintenance and Operations staff have completed an Awareness Training program. All response actions taken are within Federal and State guidelines. AHERA Management plans may be viewed by appointment at the Henry Campus, Administration Building, Health, Safety and Risk Management Office during the hours of 8:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.
