OCM BOCES Bitmoji training video goes viral


A webinar on YouTube that offers a "how to" for creating virtual Bitmoji classrooms has generated about 40,000 views from across the country. **Todd Parks**, an instructional technology integration specialist from the Central New York Regional Information Center, and **Randi Downs**, an instructional coach in Student Services, facilitated the webinar to help educators create one of these colorful virtual environments that feature



avatar versions of themselves. The virtual classroom acts as a "landing space" for materials and content so students can simply click around the classroom — on a bookshelf or whiteboard, for example — to get access to educational resources.

OCM BOCES gets special recognition for business-embedded programs

Largely because of our business-embedded Career & Technical programs, OCM BOCES was recognized recently as a "Champion of Change!" by the New York State School Boards Association (NYSSBA). The recognition came about after *Education Week* interviewed Deputy Superintendent **Colleen Viggiano** for an article that focused on CTE programs at businesses such as WCNY, Driver's Village, Lockheed Martin and Tracey Road Equipment (see story below).



NYSSBA recognizes programs as "Champions of Change!" if they optimize existing resources to address issues of equity; demonstrate strong student academic performance; and introduce unique learning environments that are cutting-edge and future-oriented. The recognition is presented quarterly to a few select districts. On Oct. 15, at the next OCM BOCES Board of Education meeting at our Cortlandville Campus, Sandra H. Students learn about heavy equipment, diesel technology at Tracey Road

In a groundbreaking program that started this fall at Tracey Road Equipment, 24 students from 10 component districts are working onsite to learn specialized skills in heavy equipment repair, operation, and diesel technology. Students in the two-year program are shadowing industry professionals and enjoying a large, dedicated work bay to



practice hands-on skills. Executives with Tracey Road, off Manlius Center Road in East Syracuse, say the partnership with BOCES will teach highly-sought skills to students who could eventually serve as future employees. Students from Baldwinsville, Cazenovia, Chittenango, Fabius-Pompey, Jamesville-DeWitt, Liverpool, Marcellus, North Syracuse, Solvay and West Genesee are "off to a great start," said their OCM BOCES teacher, **Brian Green**.

Innovation Tech staff sews 537 masks for students

Walking into Innovation Tech on the first day of school, students were not only greeted with waves and virtual hugs, but also a hallway filled with tables of masks in a variety of colors, sizes and patterns. If selected, a successful "fellow" will receive professional development from the ISS team and a spot in a participating district. 

Online learning: These students chatted with a British scientist about fruit fly brains

About 95 elementary students from several component districts converged on Zoom last spring to get a live lesson from British scientist Dr. Maria O'Hanlon, who is studying the brains of fruit flies to discover more about the genetic components of Parkinson's Disease. Dr. O'Hanlon is from Teesside University in Middlesbrough England. She shared a virtual tour of her lab, research videos, and lots of colorful slides for students who filled the Zoom "chat" with dozens of questions. The session
